Tucson Garden Railway Society spotlights 8 sites that marry model railroads and gardening.

t Double K Ranch bed and breakfast, the landscape plants do double duty, providing aesthetically pleasing gardens and creating backdrops for model railroad vignettes.

The home of Ken and Mary Karrels is among eight garden railroad sites on the annual tour put on by the Tucson Garden Railway Society.

Attendees will discover that garden railroad fans often combine two hobbies, model trains and gardening. That's what the couple does.

Mary puts in and tends to the plants that enhance the vignettes along Ken's more than 700 feet of track that wind through gardens in front of and behind their ranch house near Agua Caliente Park.

At some homes, the garden is formed around the trains. At the Double K Ranch, plants have the edge on the evolution of their railroad setup.

"This was a garden long before a train ran through it," Mary says. As part of that philosophy, she tries to accommodate volunteer plants, those that take hold with no human effort. Salt bush, mesquite and pen-

stemon grow at will, especially in the area that depicts Arizona history and sites.

When a creosote bush started to grow in the middle of a Western gunbattle on Main Street, the couple rearranged the scene so now a blacksmith shop sits under its shade.



The couple also has intentionally added plants. Vinca, blackfoot daisy, Valentine bush and other flowering plants populate vignettes that don't depict the desert, such as the forest meadow that conjures memories of Mary's Wisconsin home state. Jade succulents become crops at


the family farm. Pansies add color to the Chicago scenes from Ken's boyhood.

Because Ken and Mary heavily rely on native and volunteer plants for the landscape, they don't invest much in irrigation. Some lush areas are watered by dripper hoses.


Mary closely monitors the scale of the vegetation. Young Mexican fence post, saguaro and barrel cacti help create desert atmosphere, but once they start growing too large, she'll move them to another location. Salt bush, creosote and Texas rangers get heavy trimming to keep them tiny and shaped like





Clinic on Planning, Installing and Maintaining your Watering System. By Jack Forgues

David talked about how to modify our existing watering system and how to prepare for installing a new drip system. I thought of my irrigation system and wondered if it was installed correctly. We discussed timers, emitters, and what type of connectors to use for various situations you may run into as you do your installation. The more David talked about the drip system the more questions we came up with. By the time the clinic ended we had so much good information on how to put in a drip system, I couldn"t wait to get home and compare what I had to what was discussed at the clinic






Lincoln Model Funeral Train

About the Model


Whether you're a Lincoln fan or a railroad fan or both, you'll be impressed by this exquisite model of the Abraham Lincoln funeral train. Crafted by Dr. Wayne Wesolowski, former chemistry professor at Benedictine University in Lisle, Illinois, the accurate one-twelfth-scale model features portions of the funeral train which carried Lincoln's body from Washington, D.C. to Springfield, Illinois, in 1865. The model is now owned by the <u>Abraham Lincoln Presidential Museum</u> in Springfield, Illinois.

The model, stretching almost 15 feet long, took nearly four and one-half years to construct and represents thousands of hours of model building time. Wesolowski, who is a well-known railroad enthusiast, model builder and author, spent two years researching the funeral train and its route, and has become such an expert on the subject that staff members from the National Archives refer researchers to him for information.

Wesolowski's model features the *United States* shown above. It was the presidential railcar built for President Lincoln but not used while he was alive. Lincoln was scheduled to test-ride it on April 15, 1865, the day he died. The model includes 725 tiny parts which compose the wheels and undercarriage (Wesolowski has documented every one of them). The original car, one of the most opulent of its time, was built in Alexandria, Virginia, and was accidently destroyed by fire on March 18, 1911.


Wesolowski chose the historic *Nashville* locomotive to model (shown above), which pulled the train between Cleveland and Columbus. About 20 different locomotives were used on the 1,666-mile journey. The *Nashville* boasted three historic photographs for reference, which Wesolowski says is "three times as many as most of the others." He incorporated all the complex engineering features in his model and constructed the frame from hardwood.

In addition, Wesolowski built a model of the incredibly elaborate horse-drawn hearse which carried Lincoln's coffin in the Springfield funeral procession -- a vehicle loaned for the occasion by the mayor of St. Louis. Wesolowski created his model almost exclusively of plastic.

He also made a miniature copy (1/12 size) of the silver plaque on Lincoln's coffin, having created it through a chemical photoengraving process with help from the


Illinois Funeral Directors Association and the Illinois S^{*} perfect reproduction right down to the tiny leaf pattern need a microscope to read some of the writing. As he c way, "Chemistry is very useful."

He and his wife Mary Cay also have written a 36-page *The Lincoln Train is Coming*, which describes the orig process of building this model. TGRS conducts classes for those who are interested and provides displays at non-TGRS functions.







Steam Locomotive No. 844



Steam Locomotive No. 844 is the last steam locomotive built for Union Pacific Railroad. It was delivered in 1944. A high-speed passenger engine, it pulled such widely known trains as the *Overland Limited*, *Los Angeles Limited*, *Portland Rose* and *Challenger*.

When diesels took over all passenger train duties, No. 844 was placed in freight service in Nebraska from 1957 to 1959. It was saved from being scrapped in 1960, and held for special service.

The engine has run hundreds of thousands of miles as Union Pacific's ambassador of goodwill. It has made appearances at Expo '74 in Spokane, the 1981 opening of the California State Railroad Museum in Sacramento, the 1984 World's Fair in New Orleans and the 50th Anniversary Celebration of Los Angeles Union Station in 1989.



Steam Locomotive No. 844 (cont.)

Many people know the engine as No. 8444, since an extra "4" was added to its number in 1962 to distinguish it from a diesel numbered in the 800 series. The steam engine regained its rightful number in June 1989, after the diesel was retired.

Hailed as Union Pacific's "Living Legend," the engine is widely known among railroad enthusiasts for its excursion runs, especially over Union Pacific's fabled crossing of Sherman Hill between Cheyenne and Laramie, Wyoming.

UP 844 By Bob Dirksen


On Thursday, November 10, Glenn Mitchell and I took, for me, a trip into the past. I watched the UP 844 do its stuff east of Tucson. I had seen the 844 twice before—north of Greeley, CO, in the late 1970's and at Julesburg, CO, in the 1960's.

The 844 was the last steam locomotive to be purchased by the Union Pacific Railroad. It was built by ALCO and delivered in 1944 and is a 4-8-4 "Northern" type.

A passenger locomotive with an announced speed of 100 MPH, it was sufficiently muscular to pull freights during its latter working days. It was built to burn coal but was converted to oil late in its working life, which ended in 1959. In 1960 the UP decided to keep the 844 on its active roster for special trains and it has pulled many a trainload of railroad enthusiasts over the years.

The 4-8-4 is arguably the most aesthetically pleasing of all the steam locomotives. (The Southern Pacific Daylight is also a 4-8-4.) Its proportions of height to length and the balance of its wheel configuration lend to giving it a look of harmony. One fairly unique aspect of its appearance are the smoke wings mounted up front next to the smoke box. These wings, although they give the locomotive a distinctive appearance, are strictly utilitarian: they keep smoke from blowing into the cab. The 844 is also the last example and the culmination of 19th Century technology. Although it has about every bell and whistle that can be found on a steam locomotive, basically it is the same locomotive that moved America for over 100 years. It is the direct descendent of Stephenson's Rocket, the Best Friend of Charleston and others. It shares its chores with the Challenger, its 4-6-6-4 articulated larger "sister" in its home in Cheyenne, WY.


