




The only time traffic was halted was when members stopped to enjoy afternoon tea, Thank you to Kabita for a great running day.








How to Stop Chasing Your Locomotive

I only recently got into Gauge 1 and I jumped into the deep end by getting a Bowande A4 live steam. Having got over the huge learning curve of getting the loco to run smoothly (thanks to Geoff Hallam), I decided that I needed to add remote control to it so that I did not have to run around, to grab the loco to adjust its speed.

Having consulted with Chris Drowley, I decided to go with the Dual Use DSM2 transmitter and the LM0034e receiver.

The A4 has very little space in the cab, just barely enough space for the servo, definitely no space for the battery and receiver. The tender has the gas cylinder in it and is full of water when running, so it was not an option to put the receiver in there. At first I considered putting the battery and receiver under the tender, there is some room there if all the furniture is removed; however, in the end I decided to have a BR brake van behind the tender to carry the battery and receiver.

I got a 6V NI-MH rechargeable battery with charger from AliExpress, this plugged directly into the receiver, the transmitter allows for 2 servos to be controlled, the first thing that needed controlling was the speed, the second will be used to control the excellent whistle on the A4, that's for the next stage though. So, I got a micro mini servo with metal gearing from Ali Express that fitted nicely in the cab and some servo extension cable to connect to the receiver in the brake van via the underneath of the tender.

The next issue was that I did not have a brake van! Luckily there is a gauge 1 BR brake van 3D download on the gauge 1 3D circle.

The files include the van and the chassis and wheels, however I decided to use a Peter Korzillius wagon chassis kit as it is all metal with sprung axles, buffers etc. I had to make some modifications to the brake van base to make it fit the metal chassis, I did this using Tinkercad. and finally I got a version of the base printed that fitted the chassis nicely. The brake van is well designed with the main cab fitting to the base with some interlocking wedges; this would be very


useful for giving access to the receiver and battery if necessary.



I have never used servos before so there was next a lot of head scratching to get the servo to link and control the pressure valve lever. It took me a while to get the full 90 degrees of turn of the servo to get a matching 90 degrees on the lever, so that when the transmitter was on full it would give enough power to the loco to pull 4-6 coaches, but I got there in the end.

I was a bit worried about the servo melting in the cab as it gets very hot in that area and the servo would need to be right next to the heat source for the boiler. However this has not been a problem in the end. A small hole was drilled to attach the bracket that is holding the servo to the loco cab frame.

After lots of adjustment in the cab area I finally got the electrics in the brake van and the servo connected up in the cab and it all worked fine with no melting parts even after 3-4 hours of use.

I also put in a second servo for the whistle; this A4 has a really good whistle. I had designed a bracket in Tinkercad for the steam valve servo and 3D printed this in black. For the whistle I needed a servo up higher and deeper into the cab area. I designed and 3D printed a bracket that fit into one of the window frames in the cab, this worked really well with both brackets rock solid.

No collisions occurred, but the slightly less then skinny controller decided the drivers in question need further training for bi-directional running and for his sanity, simple clockwise running was reinstated. Good fun though and idea not completely abandoned for future instigation.









His railway is located in the back yard and it sits above a retaining wall and does a loop around the back garden. The railway has extensions at each end where the railway runs out onto elevated timber boards and loops around to connect to back to the track laid on the retaining wall and ground. These boards are put up for the running day and are packed away when not needed. The main yard is located beside a covered patio area and is conveniently located near the kitchen/dining area, which comes in handy at afternoon tea time.

The railway does not have track power so the afternoon was dominated by live steam trains and a couple of battery powered trains. There were two Roundhouse Sandy River and Rangely Lakes locos run, one belongs to Michael Hilliar and the other to Mr Hallam, Hugh Keal ran his Roundhouse George loco, while John Reinekes ran his Africanised Roundhouse Fowler and his LGB/Aster Garrett. I had a turn running my Accucraft Baguley loco and goods train. To start with I couldn't get the loco to pair with the remote until I checked the 9volt battery and found that one of the 9 volt battery terminals had completely detached from the battery. A rather unusual fault but easily fixed with a replacement battery. Chris Coles had a Bachmann ten wheeler but unfortunately it developed a drive train fault.

We had a great afternoon of good company and running trains. I would like to thank John and Candy for their hospitality.

Our February meeting will be on Saturday 8 February at Ray William's railway 5 Broadview Place, Howick. If wet the meeting will be on Sunday 9 February. Meeting start time is 1300 and please remember to bring something to share for afternoon tea. Ray does not have track power on his railway so bring battery or live steam trains.

Our March meeting will be a visit to Chas Hoskins railway, date and time to be advised. 


