Unless stated otherwise, all layouts are wheelchair accessible.

Note – For the most part, these layouts are at private homes and, therefore, public restrooms are usually not available.

The number listed before each layout is the same number that is shown on the tour map.

Layouts in the Saddlebrooke area



Viewpoint Railroad 38443 S. Viewpoint Ct. 85739

Established in 2008, five trains and two trolleys run at once; automatically starting and stopping at the depot and sidetracks by electronic control. There are two bridges going over a canyon with a river flowing below. Many features such as a circus, hobo camp and rodeo can be seen along the tracks.

From Oracle, turn east on Eagle Crest Drive on the north end of Catalina. Take your first right on to Edwin Rd. and head east not quite a mile and you will see an open gate into the Saddlebrooke area on your left. You will be on Clubhouse Dr. Turn left. Go 0.2 mi. and turn right on Mountain View Blvd. Go 0.7 mi. and turn left on Lago del Oro Pkwy which becomes Acacia Hills Lane. When this dead ends in to Ridgeview Blvd, turn right. Take the second right on Double Eagle Dr, then the first right on Canyon Shadows Lane and the first right on Viewpoint Ct. to 38443.



South Park and Western Railroad 39794 S. Riverwood Drive 85739

The South Park & Western Railroad is based on the mountain railroads of Colorado in their heyday. The layout is 20 X 70 feet in size and sits on a 2 1/2 foot tall raised "flowerbed". The motive power is Steam with fully functioning LIVE STEAM power. Come watch as the engineer fuels, fires, and runs these unique locomotives. This prosperous railroad has recently acquired the assets of a local 2 foot narrow gauge railroad which will also be in operation.

From Oracle, turn east on Eagle Crest Drive on the north end of Catalina. Take your first right on to Edwin Rd. and head east about a half mile and you will see an open gate into the Saddlebrooke area on your left. You will be on Clubhouse Dr. Take the second left onto Windwood Drive and then the first right onto Riverwood Drive.

Layouts in the Northwest area of Tucson

Rose Garden Railroad 7594 W. Talavera Way 85743

The Rose Garden RR is 670 foot double loop with the upper loop elevated with 106 handmade piers. There are 5 roses between the loops. The RR is battery operated, with no specific time period as I run both steam and diesel locomotives. A waterfall, stream, Aerial Tram, Disney Character retreat, adobe village with hotel, a ranch, Christmas village, Winery, Mine, and mountain retreat are the structures on display.

I-10 to exit 244 (Twin Peaks Rd.), turn West on Twin Peaks Rd. to Coachline Rd.. Turn Left on Coachline Rd. to Silverbell Rd. Right on Silverbell Rd. to Silver Moon Way. Right on Silver Moon Way to Talavera Way (100ft after turn on Silver Moon Way). Right on Talavera Way to the end of Cul-de-Sac.

Layouts in the Central area of Tucson



Cholla Patch Railroad 925 E. Foothills Dr. 85718

The 375 ft. Cholla Patch Railroad emphasizes the gardening aspect by incorporating a huge variety of desert plants and cactus (especially chollas). The railroad is an intricate symphony of handcrafted elaborate wood trestles, bridges, walkways and tunnel that carefully winds like a pretzel around all the plants and structures. Roughly designed to reflect turn of the century styles and technology, the extremely detailed buildings even have furnished interiors. Keep your eyes peeled for the many odd and humorous vignettes and the luxurious Victorian treehouse!

Foothills Drive is one block north of River Rd. off of 1st Ave. Turn East onto Foothills Dr. then go to the 4th house on the left (north) side of the street.



Gadsden-Pacific Division Toy Train Operating Museum 3975 N. Miller Ave. 85705

The outdoor layout will be open on Sunday from 10am to 4pm, but not on Saturday. The indoor layouts will also be open on Sunday from 1pm to 4pm. There is a \$5 per person or \$10 per family admission fee. The G-Scale Layout is one of the outdoor attractions at the Gadsden Pacific Toy Train Museum. The walk-around layout is built up in the shade of two large trees on the property. There are five complete loops, three lower ones at 24" elevation, and two upper ones at 36".

On the upper elevation is a small pond with a creek leading to a waterfall, another to a Stamp mill. One of the tracks runs over a 10 feet long wooden trestle, other tracks cross bridges spanning a canyon. The trains run through highly detailed terrain with regional highlights such as the Clifton Station and Jail, Mission San Xavier del Bac and Old Tucson. There is also a replica of the Chama Coaling Tower.

From I-10 exit East on Prince Road, making an immediate Left at the First light-Runway Drive-Turn Right on Sun Tran Blvd. The street curves to the Left- Turn left on the first road- McMillian St. Turn right onto Miller Avenue, the Museum is on the Left.

From the corner of Ruthrauff /La Cholla continue South on La Cholla, turn Left on Gardner Lane- First Right is Miller Ave.

Street parking is allowed.

Layouts in the Southwest area of Tucson



Southern Arizona Transportation Museum 414 N. Toole Avenue 85701

This location will feature two layouts...

- Located in the Museum Hall you will find an overhead railroad depicting the 1880s. The locomotive is similar to the full scale mogul locomotive next to the UP railroad tracks.
- The next layout is located right below locomotive 1673 and is a "point to point" configuration. This layout depicts some of the buildings that were in downtown Tucson in the 1880s.

The museum is located at 414 N. Toole just a few doors down from the Amtrak station.

Coming from the east or west on Broadway turn north onto Toole Avenue.

Coming from the north proceed on Stone Avenue and as you so under the heat dock you will the

Coming from the north proceed on Stone Avenue and as you go under the boat dock you will then approach Toole Avenue on your left. The museum is located at Toole and Pennington.



Tucson Wagon and History Museum (Rodeo Parade Museum) 4823 S. 6th Avenue 85714

This is a railroad based in the early frontier days of Tucson. Sections of the Tucson area included are a Mexican village, a "tent city", a stockyard and the main street downtown with its historic train station. Trains and sounds of the time bring Tucson's past to life.

Take I-19 to Irvington, go left (East) on Irvington about 1 mile, turn left (North) on 6th Ave. and the museum is on the right just north of Irvington. Or from I-10 take Irvington exit to westbound Irvington. Turn North on 6th Avenue as above to the museum on the right.



Rincon Country West RV Resort 4555 S. Mission Road 85746

The RCW layout has 5 interconnecting loops with approx. 1000 feet of track. The layout accommodates Diesel & Steam, track power or battery. During our Train-A-Thon event we have run 23 engines pulling various rolling stock. The layout depicts a canyon area, waterfall feature & rural town with farm area. "Old Town" is located along a running stream and a circus area. Four tourist trolleys and an abundance of flowers, trees and bushes showcase several whimsical vignettes. We also have a mountain with a waterfall and a lake.

Although the address is listed as Mission Road, to get to the park turn east on W. Via Ingresso. This is on Mission Road, south of Ajo Road and north of Irvington Road. Follow this road a short distance and you'll see the entrance to the park on the right. The park is gated and the guard will let you thru. Continue on the main street to the large parking lot on the left. The layout is at the far end of the parking lot.

Layouts in the East area of Tucson



Silver City, Deming and Pacific 11330 E. Concho Circle 85749

The Silver City, Deming, and Pacific, nick-named The Hummingbird Line, is a newly started garden layout. While the real SCD&P was sold to the Sante Fe in 1888, this layout presumes the railroad remained independent in 1950 as a narrow gauge line serving Silver City, Pinos Altos, and Santa Rita with connections to the outside world, off layout, at Deming. Logging, a sawmill, and copper ore make up the out-bound traffic. In the era before interstate highways, everything had to be shipped by rail, so the inbound traffic ranges from fruit-and-vegetables (in an iced car) to machinery for the mine. This is an opportunity to see the parts of a garden layout during construction, as well as talk about model rail operations.

From the corner of Houghton and Tanque Verde, take Tanque Verde 1.5 miles east to Conestoga. Turn left and take the third street on the left, Concho Cir. The house is the second on the left. 11330 E Concho Cir can also be located by Google Maps.



Catalina and Rincon Saddle Railroad 12440 E. Ave de la Vista Verde 85749

The Catalina and Rincon Saddle (CRS) Railroad is generally themed in the early steam era and conforms with the AWNUTS concept (Always Whimsical Not Usually To Scale). Conceived and constructed over 20 years ago it fulfills a long term dream of getting back into model railroading.

While most garden railroads are planned around open space with few constraints, the CRSRR is an example of creating a railroad around established landscaping. Approximately 350 feet of track meanders around the outer edges of the yard and can be operated as two independent loops, two independent 'doggone' configurations or one single long 'dogbone'. All trains are battery powered.

The layout will feature a "seek and find" for the "kid" in all of our visitors. We are a little ways out east but worth the effort.

From Tanque Verde/Houghton head east on Tanque Verde 2.5 mi to left on Fennimore. Take the second right on Avenida de la Vista Verde to 12440.
