No Meeting

In April due to the County Fair

TGRS County Fair Instructions Old Pueblo Hall

General

TGRS is one of the largest single exhibit groups at the fair. Badges and ticketing is one of their biggest challenges and we will strive to follow all the rules agreed to for our activity. TGRS Badges are NOT to be used in attempt to gain admission to either the parking areas or the fairgrounds.

I am serving as your chairman this year and Joe Stoesser has agreed to be my back-up for the days I will not be in town.

Ticketing

As usual, the fair is giving us a limited number of badges and sufficient individual tickets to meet our remaining admission requirements. The badges will serve as admission to parking and the ticketed volunteers will receive daily parking passes.

Parking (see map on next page)

It is recommended that all volunteers enter the parking area through the Brekke gate. **All badge** parking will be done in the main parking area (east side of fairgrounds).

Since our first shift is set before the opening time of fair, I believe that access to the main parking lot will only be through the Brekke gate. Volunteers with badges will be directed to that lot. Volunteers with tickets/parking tickets will directed to park in an area near the Brekke gate and will enter the fairgrounds through the livestock area.

Parking for the second shift will be in the main parking area for both badges and tickets. It is recommended that parking entry for the second shift be done through the Brekke gate as well. Using the Brekke gate will likely put you down the front row for better access to parking spaces near the main gate.

Transportation Assist on the Grounds

If you need transportation for yourself and or equipment to Old Pueblo Hall **during the fair**, go to the main gate ticket office and request they contact Old Pueblo Hall. Peggy has volunteered to assist with her golf cart based on her availability. Once the cart arrives, they will return to your car to pick up any equipment you have.

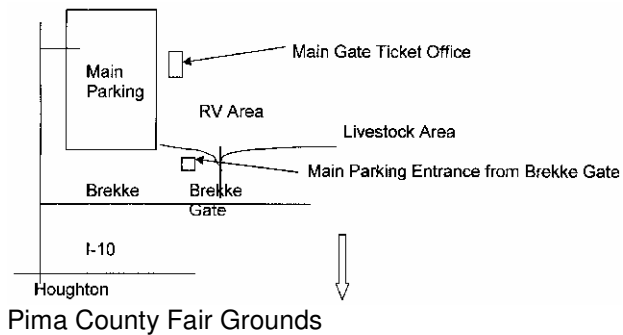
Phone Messages

Teardown

Teardown will begin at 5:30 on Sunday April 29th. Volunteers who are not on the Sunday second shift and do not have badges will be given an extra ticket for entry. In the past, if you enter the Brekke gate and tell them you are taking down a display, they have generally allowed us parking just west of the Brekke gate. We investigated getting our own golf cart for teardown, but gave up when we found we needed a separate liability insurance policy for the vehicle. As in past years, please bring small garden carts, etc. to assist those wanting to load out personal materials to their cars on Sunday.

Layout racks will be stored in the building and loaded as part of Sunday's teardown process. Our Monday activity will be limited to loading trailers. Anyone with personal displays may drive into the building on Monday as well.

The meeting was held at the Dave & Pat Tiefenbach's after a Round-a-Bout at B & B Dillon's, J & R Forgues's, H & T Hoffman's, J & B Madden's

There were 47 attendees at the meeting. We also had 3 guests.

Minutes of the February meeting were approved.

Treasurer's Report: There is a:

1. Current checking account balance of \$5,453.77.
2. Reserve account balance is \$3,009.78 for a total of all accounts of \$8,463.55.
3. Revenue to date for fiscal year 2006-2007 is \$7,038.75 and expenses are \$10,634.59
 1. for a net decrease to date of \$3,595.84.
4. Revenues to date for the Rails in the Garden tour are \$4,940 and expenses are \$726.04. Revenue for this year's event is down about \$1,000 from last year. Any returning receipts are to be turned in immediately.
5. Membership renewal is at 100.

Committee Reports:

Education Committee: Janet Mitchell reported there has not been a call for presentations.

Old Business:

Non-Profit Status: Because at the time we got our EIN #, we did not do the follow through and now we need to get our 501 (c) 4 status. Jay will deal with this to see what we need to do.

Module Repair Session: Repairs were made on all but 12 of the modules by N. Buchholz, J. Cook, G. Fritzner, D. Izen, B. Dirksen, N. Ulmer and L. Sleeper.

The last 12 will need to be done before the fair. The kid's animation and animation tables need to be built.

Rails in the Garden: Bob Dirksen is working on ideas for a gift to BBG, Ace, and our layout hosts. Peggy Martin thanked Bob for the great job he has done on this event.

County Fair: We will start at 10.00 A.M. on April 16th.

2008 Convention Report:

Norm: There are only 400 days left until the convention and money is needed for prints ads and, Convention Car, signage, etc. The seed monies have not been sufficient to keep up with the requirements. A typical family registration, including meals, tours, commemorative car and DVD will run around \$450.00. We would like to get as many families as possible to register in the next 30 days to generate funds.

ABTO members have voted to have their volunteers register and pay the Registration Fee, in an effort to raise money. A volunteer is a person who did not

participate in any of the events but simply worked at the Convention on one or more services. At the conclusion of the Convention, the registration Fees would be returned. So, in affect the fees are really a loan to the Convention. The fees will be refunded before the net proceeds are divided. A proposal was then made by Norm that the TGRS members who are volunteering at the Convention to pay a registration fee, either as an individual or a couple, whichever is appropriate, with the understanding that the fee will be refunded after the convention closes. Filmmaker Bill Daniel In Person

Head downtown to the Historic Train Depot for a trackside train date with railroad history and contemporary art as filmmaking maverick Bill Daniel presents an in-person outdoor screening of his recent film *Who is Bozo Texino?*

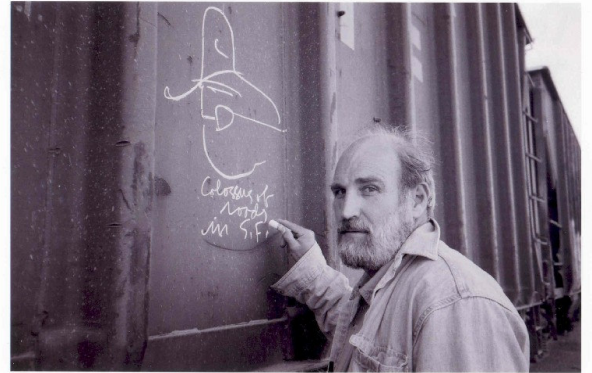
An epic search and unlikely discovery of hoboemia's most legendary boxcar artist, this truly independent and original film was shot on freight hopping trips across the American West over the course of 16 years. Historically accurate, painstakingly researched, and faithfully rendered in style and tone, the film chronicles the search for the source of a ubiquitous and mythic rail graffiti seen on railcars for over 80 years -- a simple sketch of a character with an infinity-shaped hat and the scrawled moniker, "Bozo Texino." Daniel's film uncovers the pathos of the underground universe of hobo and railworker graffiti and includes interviews with legendary (and now elderly) boxcar artists Coaltrain, Herby, Colossus of Roads, and The Rambler. Daniel reveals the roots of a folkloric tradition and mysterious artform that has gone mostly unnoticed for 100 years while simultaneously capturing the free-spiritedness of the travel adventurers who ride the rails for free, both railworkers and hobos alike. Taking inspiration from Beat artists Robert Frank and Jack Kerouac, the film also functions as a sub-cultural documentary and a stylized fable on wanderlust and outsider identity

For anyone interested in railroad history, documentary filmmaking and photography, free-spirited hoboing, and the beauty of the America West as seen from the top of a boxcar at sunrise this one time showing should not be missed.

Filmmaker Bill Daniel

In 1987 Daniel and his trusty Bolex camera began hanging out in hobo jungles and riding freights across the American West, looking for clues to the identity of a strange boxcar graffiti. While gathering interviews and discovering clues to the identities of many of the most legendary boxcar artists, Daniel discovered a vast underground folkloric practice that has existed with little notice for over a century. Today these drawings live on as a new breed of hobos have taken to the rails and kept the tradition of "moniker chalking" alive. This artform provides unlikely common ground between mostly conservative railworkers and old school tramps and the kids whose approach includes spray cans and punk lifestyles.

Since completing the film in June 2005, Bill Daniel and his film have been on the road, wowing audiences of punks, geezers, folkies, foamers and graffiti toughs all over the U.S. "Who is Bozo Texino?" premiered at Deitch Projects in New York City and at Yerba Buena Center for the Arts in San Francisco. It screened at Rotterdam and several other European festivals, and has been presented on tour in over 170 cities and universities in Canada and the US.

Bill Daniel's homegrown epic is as kinetic and raggedly beautiful as the trains he hopped to make it. A film about freedom as literal passage across the land. Corporations brand things to say they own them, but there are ways in which humans have marked things to say they can't be owned. ---Jem Cohen

Who Is Bozo Texino? Is a great American movie, and its greatness is tied up very closely with its American-ness. With this brilliant experimental documentary, self-styled hobo filmmaker Daniel places himself firmly in the bootprints of Jack London, Jack Kerouac, Walt Whitman, Woody Guthrie - a fine, long tradition of American artists who look for their inspiration to the marginal, the underclass, the vagabond and the outcast. Nominally a chronicle/survey/history of boxcar graffiti

(a tradition as old as the railroad itself) and the men who create it, *Who Is Bozo Texino?* soon transcends its narrow subject-matter to become a gloriously rough-edged elegy for an America which is being swept away before our eyes.

Unlike the overwhelming majority of documentaries - even entertaining recent examples like *Murderball*, *Dogtown* and *Z-Boys and Stoked* - Daniel's film manages a near-perfect union of radical form and radical content, And it does so in consistently accessible style: at first you're intrigued by the stunning monochrome images captured by his self-effacing, sensitively-handled camera(s); by the startling kineticism of his fluent editing style; by the sheer range of voices, music and sound-effects we hear as he tracks down a series of grizzled hobos and wisdom-dispensing graffiti-'markers.'

Then you realize that, just as these men have always instinctively rejected authority and convention, Daniel has likewise embraced the unorthodox in his style of filmmaking - even down to his choice of title and running-time. Indeed, in less than an hour Daniel manages to say more about life, art, America and the simple joy of filmmaking than most directors manage in decades. --- Neil Young, Neil Young's Film Lounge

Bill Daniel

Born Dallas, Texas 1959

Texas-born, San Francisco exile, and confirmed tramp, Bill Daniel continues to experiment with survivalism and bricolage in his attempts to record and report on the various social margins he often finds himself in. Working without an art or film school education, he endeavors to make work that connects with an outsider audience. His work began in 1980 as he participated in and photo documented the blossoming punk rock scene in Austin, Texas. Since then his subcultural documentary subjects have included bicycle messengers, radical environmentalists, hobo graffiti artists, swap meet guitar players, rural drag racers, and "water squatters"--outlaw anchored live-aboards. His study and love for documentary photography and filmmaking has given Daniel the charge to create work that communicates across socioeconomic boundaries. Drawing from his backgrounds in studio photography, experimental media and the construction trades, Daniel builds site-specific viewing environments as a method for deploying non-linear documentary material within an allegorical, interactive setting.

Daniel's work has received awards from the Film Arts Foundation, The Pioneer Fund, Texas Filmmaker Production Fund, the R & B Feder Charitable Foundation, and The Western States

Media Alliance. He is the current Wattis Foundation artist-in-residence at the Yerba Buena Center for the Arts, where his installation "Souls Harbor" was exhibited in Dec. In 1999 he was in-residence at The Headlands Center for the Arts where he produced several multi-projection 16mm film installations, including "Trespassing Sign" in collaboration with the late Margaret Kilgallen. In 2001 his hobo campfire installation "The Girl on the Train in the Moon" was included in "Widely Unknown" at Deitch Projects in New York. A veteran of the touring scene, Daniel has programmed, booked and exhibited several mobile art shows, including the Lucky Bum Film Tour with partner Vanessa Renwick. In 1997-98 he curated a weekly screening series, Funhouse Cinema, in Austin, that also regularly screened in Houston and San Antonio. Daniel is also recognized for his work as cinematographer and editor for filmmaker Craig Baldwin. Other endeavors include publishing two zines--The Western Roundup, a punk fanzine in 1981-82, and Detour, a situationist journal in 1986. He is also the creator of an experimental sports league, The Texas Gas-Powered Leaf Blower Hockey Association.
