#### Title: Hand Lettering your Freight Cars **Author: David Maynard**

As most of us who model, I have a need for lettering. And since dry transfers are getting hard to find around here, or are a special order item. And since they never seem to be in the color I want. And since I have not found them in some of the fonts I need. And since when I do use them I have all these letters left over I can't use like ZXQ and such. I decided that I would work out doing my own lettering.

As you may be able to understand I am limited in how small a type of lettering I can do by hand. But since I don't tend to worry too much about the real small details that part doesn't bother me.

So the first step is to find the type style (font) I want to use, and in the age of computers there are literally thousands to choose from. Then I print out what I want to put on what I am painting. By adjusting the font size I can make it come out whatever size I need on my printer. Or better yet I print it out as large as possible and reduce it on a copier to the correct size I need.



Then on the model I lay down a sheet of transfer paper or carbon paper (remember carbon paper kids?). Transfer paper will leave white on the model where it's rubbed, and of course carbon paper will leave black. The one I use depends on the color of

lettering I am doing, light colored lettering I use the transfer paper and dark colored lettering I use the carbon paper. Then I tape the paper with the lettering (artwork) onto the model, positioning it properly.

To transfer the outline I take an old ballpoint pen that has long ago run out of ink and run it firmly along the outline of the letters on the paper.

Did I mention I hardly ever throw anything away? But in the picture you see me using a pencil, today I couldn't find that pen. Have I also mentioned that I am a bit disorganized? When I use a pencil I have to keep it sharp, and that takes longer. As I go I will, from time to time, lift the paper to make sure I am getting a good image on the model, this is why I usually tape only along the top edge. But sometimes, as in this case, I need to tape along more then just the top to hold the artwork still. Then when I have a good outline of the letters I remove the papers.



Then it's a matter of painting between the lines with a small brush.



I know that right now someone out there is saying "My hand isn't steady enough to do that." Well neither is mine. So when I do make a mistake I let the paint dry and then carefully scrape the error off with a new Xacto blade.



It usually takes me going over the letters about 3 times to get them filled in real nice and to fix my mistakes. Sure it is a bit time consuming, but I end up with exactly what I want with no wasted letters. And the looks on people's faces when I tell them its hand painted are priceless.

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#### Trains and Coins Jim Miller

Several years ago (1981) I stumbled onto a display of coins with trains on them. I had gone with my brother who is a coin dealer to help him out at a coin show and when it wasn't busy I was walking around looking at different tables and one of the dealers had a display of three coins with trains on them. That immediately got my attention, and for the next several years I looked for the coins. A Mexico 1950 Cinco (5) Pesos large silver coin, Brazil 1938 200 Reis, and a Canada 1981 Dollar in a proof set. I was able to buy a Canadian proof set that day, the Mexician 5 Pesos took a couple of years to find, and the Brazilian 200 Reis took several more years to find as it was a very inexpensive coin so the coin dealers don't usually stock them.

I have found a few more coins over the years. 1986 Canada Proof Dollar minted to commemorate the centennial of their transcontinental railroad. 1999 Canadian 25 cents Coast to Coast. The Canadian \$20 Transportation Series 2000-2003, each year there were three coins; a train, an automobile, and a sailing ship. I haven't bought all of them yet but probably will. 1883 Swiss 5 Francs shows a train coming out of a tunnel. There are a couple of Korea coins 2001 and 2002. And of course the 2007 Utah State Quarter commemorating the driving of the Golden Spike. While doing research for this article I found three more coins, 1857 Austria 2 Talers, 1991 Hungary 500 Forint, and 1994 Russia 25 Rubles, these are a little pricier than the others. There are most likely other coins that I don't know about yet.

While looking for train coins I came across several commemorative train pieces (not legal tender) that can be fun to collect. A few of them are silver but many are other metals including Aluminum. I also ran across some stamps with trains as many of the coin dealers also sell stamps and when you ask if they have any coins with trains on them they like to show you everything they have with a train on it.
