## Eagle Mountain Garden Railroad

Gary started his garden railway in 1992 after buying his first Garden Railway magazine.

It was decided that the design of the railroad would be educational and aesthetic and that the theme of the railroad would be the early diverse events that took place in Arizona between the late 1800's and the mid 1900's. As you walk through the garden, look closely and you will see miniature scenes that depict these early events. The garden is divided into two distinctive areas: mountains and desert. The layout has grown in four phases: first was the town area and 50 feet of track. Next came the logging area with waterfall and ponds the third phase was the desert mining area. The fourth phase is the raised track as you enter the train yard and was designed exclusively to extend the total footage of

running track. The garden incorporates a variety of native with other colorful plants that have been chosen for their resistance to desert animals. We have enjoyed a project that brings two hobbies together, gardening and model railroading.

#### **Rail Fans Tour 2008**

Early on the morning of September 24 Norm and I boarded an airplane on our way to join a group of "Rail Fans" on a trip to Europe. In Cincinnati we met seven couples, mostly from ABTO, and boarded the plane for Amsterdam. When we arrived at our hotel we were met by Ellen and Joe Stoesser and Peggy and Gary Martin who had gone ahead a couple of days before.

We were barely settled in our rooms when the sightseeing began. The next few days were spent seeing the sights in the area including museums, the Anne Frank house, a wooden shoe factory, the international flower market, the diamond market and of course, windmills. We also toured a "replica" Dutch village on the shore of the Zuider Zee. Oh, and, by the way, some of us took an evening tour of "the district" that is so famous.

On the 28<sup>th</sup> we took an all day intercity train trip to Bern, Switzerland. The next day we took the *Golden Pass Panoramic Train*. We went from sea level at Lake Geneva, passed through alpine meadows and crossed the spine of the Alps. There's no comparison to the beauty of the Alpine countryside. While in Montreux we went by boat to Chillon castle built in the 13<sup>th</sup> century.

Early on the 30<sup>th</sup> we took another train to Zermatt and then took a series of gondolas and cable cars to the top of Klein Matterhorn. From the rarified 127063 ft altitude we saw skiers on the slopes and an Italian village in the valley among other views.

We returned to Bern and had dinner at the famous restaurant Kornhouskeller built in 1714.



On October 1 we boarded the train to Milan, Italy and were there in time for lunch and a bus tour of the city. We were able to see the famous Di Vinci painting of The Last Supper at the Cenacolo Vinciana. We then proceeded to Como where we spent the next two nights. The villas, hotels and casinos on the lake are amazing as well as the list of celebrities who spend time there.

Then on the third we took a bus to Florence where we saw more churches and art museums including the famous statue of David by Michelangelo. The next day we took a bus trip through the beautiful Tuscan countryside with its vineyards and Olive groves to Sienna and San Gimignano.

On the 5<sup>th</sup> we toured Lucca, the birth place of Puccini, and went to Pisa to see the leaning tower. We were all surprised to learn that the bell tower is not the only building that is leaning. The Duomo and the other buildings also lean.



The following day we boarded the motor coach that took us to Rome. In the afternoon we saw the sights of the city from the bus with our guide who reminded us that "Rome wasn't built in a day." On Tuesday we had a full day touring such places as the

Catacombs, the Vatican Gardens, St Peters Basilica, the Vatican museum and the Sistine Chapel. Ellen and Joe were fortunate enough to spend time with Tucson's Bishop Kicanus who was in Rome for a meeting of Bishops. They also were able to attend the Papal Audience on Wednesday.

On the 8<sup>th</sup> we had a free day and we all made the most of it visiting Roman ruins, the Colusseum and other highlights of Rome. It was all capped off by a farewell dinner and a night time tour of the city.

Thursday the 9<sup>th</sup> was spent on airplanes heading home and adjusting to our mundane life in Tucson while remembering the sights, sounds and tastes of a wonderful trip.

#### **MONTHLY LUNCHEON & TRAIN VIEWING!!!**

We have been invited to Dale Cover's house on Thursday Nov. 13<sup>th</sup> to view his many train layouts and then go to lunch afterwards. Dale lives at 4733 E. Montecito, which is a couple blocks south of Broadway and his house is just east of Swan. To get there from the south just turn on to Montecito, which is between 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup>. From the north you can: a) Go past 17<sup>th</sup> and past Montecito and make a U-turn on Swan and come back to his street, or b) turn left on 17<sup>th</sup> and go several blocks, then right on Niven and right on his street back to 4733. Dale has many small loops of trains in all scales, both indoors and out. In addition he has a homemade train YOU CAN RIDE ON, and a homemade monorail (no, you can't ride on that). If that is not enough, he has a Koi pond and a greenhouse and a great workshop with many neat solutions to common problems. We will gather at his house at 10 a.m. and a little after 11 a.m. we will move over to the Hungry Fox Restaurant and Store at 4637 E. Broadway (NW corner Broadway/Swan) for lunch. #### Progress on the Golembiewski's RR

Inspired by a raised layout we saw during one of the Rails in the Gardens tour a couple of years ago, and because we are getting older and creakier, we decided to construct our own raised layout.

We used concrete block as a perimeter, 4 to 5 levels depending on the slope of the backyard and Wonder Board for the top. We also used pressure treated 2x4's and Trex composite decking (16 inch on center) for the frame work. Also 4x4's pressure treated wood for the legs, approximately every two feet apart.

The track and switches are AristoCraft stainless steel, and at present we will be using track power, wiring in progress, 14 AWG for short runs, and 12 AWG for longer runs, with jumper wires attached approximately every 6 to 8 feet. We used Split Jaw and AristoCraft rail joiners.



We have installed Sierra Sound in one locomotive.

The freight station and log cabin are scratch built.



The bridge is removable for easy access to the U shaped layout. Wiring is under the Wonder Board.

The mountain is actually a faux stone garden fountain, with large stones from our yard complimenting the fountain. There will be a lake at the bottom, with possibly real water.

We have more buildings to put up and much more scenery to put down.

No name for the railway yet, but our kids call it The Bunker.
