Clinic on Desert planting, small plants, pruning and Tools

On Saturday, June 12, 2010, about 20 members of TGRS attended a desert planting clinic at the Rillito Nursery at 6303 N. LaCholla Blvd. It was a very rewarding morning, starting with coffee, water, and a delicious homemade treat.

Our guide, Stephanie, was very knowledgeable about the use of small plants for garden railroads, as well as how to prune and fertilize them. She shared her ideas for the best plants to use in the shade and the sun, and the pros and cons of each variety. She patiently answered all questions and provided invaluable insight into the world of desert plants.

We also had an interesting segment about various herbs and ground covers, and summer vs. winter types of plants, and a short presentation about pond plants.

Preparing the ground is one of the most important steps in ensuring that plants thrive in our tough desert soil. Tips for dealing with caliche were provided, ranging from the good old pick axe to sulphuric acid! Mulching is also necessary to improve the soil around the plants, as is a root stimulator, which is a liquid fertilizer/rooting hormone/transplant shock reducer.

One of the most interesting aspects of the morning was finding out which plants repel 'critters' such as javelinas. Stephanie provided information about how to plant critter repellant plants around the more edible and appealing plants. One of the members suggested just planting a separate garden for the javelinas, rabbits and such!

The next clinic at the nursery will be Saturday, July 31st, detailing irrigation systems and how to best water your plants. Be sure to wear comfortable shoes, sunscreen, and a hat.

The end of May we went to Utah to see our Daughter Angela, son-in-law Michael, and granddaughter Mahalie. We went to Promontory Point to see the Golden Spike site. This is our third trip out there and probably not the last. When we arrived only the Jupiter was out as 119 had been in the day before for a boiler wash and it takes six hours to bring the boiler up to pressure. Just after 2:30 p. m. they brought 119 out so we were able to see both locomotives. The original locomotives were scrapped around the first of the Twentieth Century for the going price of \$1000.00 each. The replica locomotives were built in the mid 1970's and are said to be within 1/4" of the originals. The locomotives were recently converted to burn their original fuels instead of the oil they had been burning, 119 now burns coal and the Jupiter burns wood.

TUCSON GARDEN RAILWAY SOCIETY MINUTES OF THE GENERAL MEETING JUNE 19, 2010

The meeting was called to order by the President, Norm Ulmer, at 10:00 AM at the home of Jim White. There were approximately 28 present. Jim was thanked for hosting the meeting.

There were no guests present and no new members.

The minutes of the previous meeting (May, 2010) were approved as published in the newsletter.

Vice-President Willis Fagg reported:

- The ABTO tour has been tentatively scheduled for Nov. 6th. A show of hands for layouts to be open for this included Gary Martin, Nick Buchholz, Glenn Mitchell, and Barry Blackwell.
- 2. The new online calendar is up and running Willis requested feedback via email.
- 3. U of A Presents is having a children's festival Oct. 17th and would like to have the children's layout. There was some discussion about the feasibility of setting up the layout for a 2-hr event and, most importantly, whether it must be set up outdoors. This layout is not grounded and is not suitable for an outdoor event. Some alternatives were proposed such as providing information on how to design a garden layout, showing a DVD of layouts, the Power Point educational presentation, etc.
- A quick to set up display for educational purposes has been proposed and will be discussed further at the next Board of Directors meeting.

In Ruth Taylor's absence, Norm read the Treasurer's Report:

1. Total on deposit: \$36,466.42

2. Revenues from 5/15/10: \$469.46

3. Expenses from 5/15/10: \$442.70

4. Net revenues from 5/15: \$26.76

5. Total dues paid for 2010-11: \$270.00

The Treasurer's Report was approved.

The Editor, Jim Miller, reported that the newsletter is going well and asked the membership to keep sending in articles.

Gary Martin reported that the Maintenance Committee had no new issues and that he is still waiting for parts.

Nick Buchholz reported that the Mentoring Committee is going well and that most of the members' concerns are electronics-related. Ibby Ulmer reported that there have been no new members added to the roster and that she is accepting dues payments in the Treasurer's absence. Ibby also requested that those members wishing to mail in checks for dues should mail them directly to Ruth Taylor.

In Chuck Cook's absence, it was noted that a social event is being planned for a Sunday on Mt. Lemmon.

Jack Forgues reported that 24 attended the first clinic at Rillito Nursery. A signup sheet for the 7/31 event on drip irrigation (at Rillito Nursery) was circulated. The people-making clinic is scheduled for 9/18 and the layout startup/track planning clinic for 10/03.

Old Business:

Jerry Tulino was thanked for his efforts in getting the online calendar up and running. He and Willis worked together in getting the events for the next year posted. The membership was advised to check it periodically for updates.

Norm reported that he and Nick had picked up the Diamond Children's Center track support system on 6/18. They will lay it out and check it in the Cooks' garage.

Converted convention cars are available at \$40 each.

Jerry presented a letter of thanks from the Ronald McDonald house for the Chef for a Day event. This was given to Jim Miller to print in the newsletter.

New Business:

Following the September meeting at Jack and Rosalie Forgues' home, Ron Koehler has invited the club members to his home to see his live steam engines in operation.

The Mt. Lemmon picnic date and time are to be announced.

Reminder: The ABTO tour is tentatively set for 11/06.

Gary Martin brought a structure for Show & Tell. His annual open house is scheduled for Nov. 13: open to the public from 11 AM to 3 PM and the club meeting to begin at 3 PM.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

The minutes of the May BOD meeting were approved as read.

The Treasurer's Report was approved.

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Editor's Report: Will add event dates to back page of newsletter. Will also include notice about dues.

Committee Reports:

Clinic Committee – The first clinic at Rillito Nursery was attended by 24 and very well received. An article for the newsletter is planned. Future clinics include: 7/31 drip irrigation, 9/18 people-making, 10/23 layout planning. Jack will give details to the Editor and Webmaster to publicize.

Membership Committee – No new members. Mentoring Committee – Nick is currently helping Jerry Tulino with a sound system.

Social Committee – No report. The next social is scheduled for 06/17.

Old Business:

- A. Norm and Nick are planning to go to Phoenix to pick up the track structure for the Diamond Children's Center on Friday, 06/18. To borrow Barry's car trailer and furniture pads. The Cooks have offered their RV garage to set up and check out the system prior to its installation.
- B. A secure location for layout trailer storage is being sought. Ruth has identified a location on the west side. The annual fee would be \$300 for the 1st trailer, \$270 for the 2nd and 3rd
- C. Clinics see Committee Report above.
- D. There is a problem with the tunnel location at the Diamond Children's Center. Nick is working to resolve this.
- E. Barry to check equipment rental companies for a duct jack.
- F. No progress to date on the impedence devices for the modular layout.
- G. Event schedule now online; some dates are still tentative. The ABTO tour is proposed for 10/30 or 11/06, pending their club's feedback. A show of hands at the next general meeting for 4-6 open layouts is proposed. A request for the children's layout

for a Challenger Little League function will be declined due to grounding issues; would be willing to do it if an indoor locale can be found. The swap meet went well, even with only a few volunteers. Willis is proposing to pick up track to match the donated track while in California over the July 4th weekend. He agreed also to check on power supply limiters for the Diamond Children's Center. Engines are on order.

- H. Need to purchase two TE Xmtr controllers and send the old ones back for repair.
- Tucson Botanical Gardens Glenn to pursue obtaining an enclosure for their equipment.
 Diamond Children's Center – discussion

Diamond Children's Center – discussion about setting up the control system. To set it up to run two circuits, then stop. A vandal-proof start switch needs to be purchased. The Board authorized up to \$100 for battery-charging circuit boards.

Rails in the Garden 2011 – to be held March 12 &13 with Martins, Buchholz, Rincon Country West and some Saddlebrook layouts (so far). Need a central locale for tickets. Ticket/map configuration was discussed. There was some discussion about "comping" tickets for special-interest groups like Big Brothers & Big Sisters, Ronald McDonald House; these tickets could be made to look like RR passes but would not be eligible for the drawing. It was decided that we would repeat the food bank donations as well.

New Business:

- A Summer Sunday on Mt. Lemmon Thorne Pierce has offered to host again.
- B. Ron Koehler will have his live steam layout open after the meeting hosted by Jack and Rosalie Forgues. Jack asked for help with a track and motherboard problem.
- C. It was suggested that a technical advice session be added as a clinic.

There being no further business to come before the Board, the meeting was adjourned.

Our new Calendar of Events on our Web Site Thanks to Jerry Tulino with the dates entered by Willis Fagg


We have setup and populated a completely new "Calendar of events" page for the web site that will display our scheduled events for many months in the future. This document is intended to describe some

of the features of the new calendar. There is much more that it can do so you are encouraged to "kick the tires". The program and the event data are protected from changes so you cannot do any damage by clicking on the various links to see what else it can do

When you click on the "Calendar of events" item on the main menu, a new page will be displayed as seen below. This page contains both a link to the full calendar and a window that displays several of the upcoming events in order by date...



The "Upcoming events list" has links to the events as well as a short description that pops up when you hover your mouse over the name of the event...



Additionally, when you click on an event, a window that shows all of the information about the event is displayed...



Note – The "Export this entry" at the bottom of the event display allow you to export the event to your personal calendar on your PC. If you have any questions about this feature, please email me at webmaster@tucsongrs.org.

Once you click on the "Click here to display the full events calendar" link the train really leaves the station. A full year calendar is displayed and every date that has an event scheduled is show with a red background. Weekends are displayed in dark green and the current day is the yellow day.



You can navigate this calendar to last year or next year by clicking on the big arrows just below the title bar. The "My Calendar" item on the menu lets you select the type of calendar that you wish to display. For example you might want to see just one month at a time...



If the current month is not the one you wish to look at you can either click on the name of the month...




Or you can click on the "drop down arrow" and select the month you want...



The month calendar also displays the previous and next months. If you want to go to June you could just click on the name of the month to go there. Or, suppose you want to see what is on the schedule for June 12. You can click on the date itself...



And the calendar for that day will be displayed.



Again, you can hover the mouse over the event to see the expanded description...



And, if you click on the event itself, all of the information about the event is displayed...



When you are finished viewing the calendar you can click on "Exit" from the menu...
