

#### The Show Low Historical Society Museum by Chuck Cook

In the last issue I reported about The Apache Railway Co. based west of Snowflake, AZ. I had also been told that the Show Low Historical Society was working on a model railroad of the line. I went to the Historical Society and was shown a very nice HO scale railroad in progress that will depict the line when it ran from the logging town of Maverick. The local club members working on the layout gave me a lot of nice information and showed me a map of what had been the entire line. They also said one of the old trestles still remained near the center of Snowflake-more on that later.



As mentioned before; the mill for these wood products was located in McNary, AZ, and some of those building still exist. It turns out that Maverick, AZ was a little harder to find on a map. That was because trying to follow the rail line on a map, it sort of peters out many miles southeast of McNary. It turns out that Maverick is located (I say is, but currently have no confirmation if any of the town remains, especially after the Wallow Fire) many miles south of the area of Big Lake. The line did have a siding at Big Lake and after that still had many mountainous miles to go. I must correct one thing stated in the previous article. I had said that Apache Railway Co. at the time moved the timber from Maverick to McNary and then to the paper mill. In fact, the line in that earlier time was owned by the Santa Fe Railroad and its main purpose was to get the timber from Maverick to the mills in McNary, where it was then turned in to railroad ties. It then moved the ties to the Santa Fe main line at Holbrook for the railroads expanding empire. If you are in the Show Low area, I recommend the Show Low Historical Society Museum. It is free and information and hours can be found at

www.showlowmuseum.com. A word of warning; there is a similar museum right next door, so if you want to see the train layout, be sure you get the correct place. Oh, and the trestle. With a little help we found it just off Main St. in Snowflake. It is in good shape and you can walk across it. Unfortunately, it stands alone, and hopefully some day will be part of a walking or bike path.
