

Monday, Glenn Mitchell came in and laid the power and control wiring lines, and today we completed the track placement. Here are some photos of the track in place.





Ballasting will begin shortly, when TMC's people bring in some fill dirt to use in transitioning the track from the bridge decks to the ground.

Meanwhile, I've kept busy building the train shed that will house the trains when they are not running. Some pictures of that shed are attached.

2011 Garden Rail Fans to Sweden, Norway, Denmark and Germany September 21st to October 6th, 2011

TGRS members Gary and Peggy Martin, Bob and Sue Averill, Chuck and Ruth Taylor joined Rich Hull's (ABTO-Phoenix) 7th Garden Rail Fans trip to Sweden, Norway, Denmark and Germany. Our group totaled 23.



The majority of the group met at the Phoenix airport, changed planes in Detroit and Amsterdam for a final destination of Stockholm. We traveled by plane, coach (bus), ferry and, most importantly, by train in our two week journey through Scandinavia and Germany.

We arrived in Stockholm on Day 2 at 12:15 pm (3:00 am Arizona time) and were immediately on the go for a half day tour including the Vasa Museum (a Viking warship that sank on it's maiden voyage in 1628), the Royal Palace which is the King's official residence and where the business of the country is conducted and City Hall built in 1907 where the business of the city is conducted and is the site of the Nobel Prize presentations and banquets.

Days 3, 4, 5, 6, 7 and 8 were spent touring by coach, ferry and train (with frequent scenic stops along the way) through Sweden and into Norway with overnight stays in Hamar, Geiranger, Laerdal, Bergen and Oslo, Norway

Along the way we toured the Maihaugen Museum, which is an open-air museum with 200 old and new buildings, exhibitions, cafes and activities. The museum was founded by the dentist, Anders Sandvig, in 1887 and moved to Maihaugen in 1904. It is an amazing example of 18th century life in Norway complete with original furnishings (some dating back to the Middle Ages), tools and even fireplaces.

We boarded our first train on the only rainy day of the trip in Flaam, changed trains in Myrdal and met our coach in Voss to continue on to Bergen. Bergen is a charming waterfront city with a very busy harbor. Along the waterfront are cobbled streets and extremely old buildings dating back to the Viking era which are leaning to the side and seem to be holding each other upright. From Bergen we traveled by coach to and ferry to Oslo where we stayed overnight in the very elegant Thon Bristol Hotel.

In Oslo we toured the Akershus Castle built in 1299 and today serves many functions of the country's government, the Vikingship Museum which is the only museum in the world housing as many artifacts of the Viking era, and Frogner Park, a public park containing the world famous Vigeland Sculpture Park featuring 212 bronze and granite sculptures (the most popular being the "angry boy") all designed by Gustav Vigeland. The day concluded at the pier where we boarded a ferry for an overnight trip to Copenhagen.

The beauty off Sweden and Norway is indescribable in words and though we all took many pictures of villages, farms, fjords, waterfalls and harbors we will always remember our tour of this picturesque countryside.

Our first stop in Copenhagen was to view the statue of The Little Mermaid based on a tale by Hans Christian Andersen. It is a small and unimposing statue which sits on a rock in the harbour. It is a Copenhagen icon and a major tourist attraction. Copenhagen is the bicycle capital of the world and pedestrians need to be wary. The have total rightof-way in their bicycle lanes and they really move along. Stepping in their path could cause an accident for which the pedestrian is held liable for all damages. Copenhagen has more bridges than Venice, Italy. We toured the Rosenborg Castle which was a Royal residence until 1710 and today is mainly a museum of Danish artifacts, Amalienborg Museum which is the winter home of Denmark's Royal family and houses many artifacts of the monarchy, and the Christianborg Palace which houses Denmark's House of Parliament, the Supreme Court and the Ministry of State. More than a thousand years ago, King Harald founded the kingdom of Denmark. The Danish monarchy is a unique institution. An unbroken royal line of fifty kings and two queens is actually a world record. We were disappointed that Tivoli Gardens, one of the oldest amusements parks in the world, was closed for the season.

Sweden, Norway and Denmark are all parliamentary democracies. While their monarchs have little real political or legislative power they fill an important symbolic function as representatives of their countries society and industry.

Day 10 we boarded a flight to Hamburg, boarded a bus and arrived at Miniatur-Wunderland which is the world's largest model railway layout and the highlight of our trip.

As of January 2011, the railway consists of 12,000 meters (39,370 ft) of track in HO scale, divided into seven sections: Harz, the fictitious city of Knuffingen,

the Alps and Austria, Hamburg, America, Scandinavia, and Switzerland. The section covering an airport opened in May 2011. The airport is named Knuffingen International Airport (featuring planes that take-off and land) and is modeled after Hamburg International Airport.

The exhibit includes 890 trains made up of over 11,000 carriages, 300,000 lights, 215,000 trees, and 200,000 human figurines. The exhibit is expected to have reached its final construction phase by 2020. Many of you have probably received e-mail videos of this incredible layout. If not, check is out on the internet (**Miniatur-Wunderland**) for many pictures and videos of this magnificent layout. Our admission included a behind the scenes tour of the entire exhibit which gave us real insight on the mechanics and construction of the display.

Day 11 we boarded an ICE train (Inter-City Express) which operate all over Germany connecting all the major cities. These trains travel at speeds of up to 200 mph. Our destination was Nuremberg founded around the 11th century and is famous among other things as the site of huge Nazi Party conventions (the Nuremberg rallies.) The rallies were held annually from 1927 to 1938 in Nuremberg. During World War II, Nuremberg was a Nazi military headquarters and an important site for military production including aircraft, submarines and tank engines. The Nuremberg trials were held here between 1945 and 1946. The walled city was beautifully restored after the War and today is architecturally an amazing town.

Several of the group opted to visit the Deutch Bahn Railroad Museum, and view the Hitler Parade Grounds. Unfortunately, the hall where the Nuremberg trials were held was not open to tourists because it was Sunday. Peggy Martin, Sue Averill, Sharon Hull and I took two other ladies and traveled by subway to the village of Fürth to experience a traditional German Oktoberfest faire. Many faire goers were dressed in traditional dirndls and lederhosen. We shopped and ate our way through the day.

Day 13 we boarded another ICE train to Munich and transferred to a regional train on to Garmisch-Partenkirchen, site of the 1936 Winter Olympics the first to feature Alpine skiing. Our two-day stay here gave us plenty of time for sightseeing, shopping and relaxing in this picturesque setting at the base of the Bavarian Alps.

On day 14 most of our group boarded the cogwheel train (Zugspitzbahn) to Zugspitzplatt which is the tallest mountain in Germany. They continued to the summit (9,718 feet above seal level) by cable car. From this vantage point, a 360-degree panorama view of more than 400 peaks in Austria, Italy,

Switzerland and Germany is spread before your eyes. The highest beer garden in Germany is also on the summit.

I was torn between the cogwheel train tour and the opportunity to visit a castle with Peggy Martin and three other adventurers. I chose the castle and with Peggy's lead we found our way to "Schloss Neuschwanstein" the castle of King Ludwig II of Bavaria near Füssen. The two-hour bus ride and 30 minute hike up to the castle was well worth the effort.

Day 15 we traveled by regional train back to Nuremberg and transferred to an ICE train for our final destination of Frankfurt where we would board our plane for the return trip home the next day.

Our last night was spent together as a group for dinner and some final instructions regarding the procedures through immigration and customs for getting back into the United States.

Altogether our journey leaves us with fond memories of people and places, there is so much more. As I look at my pictures, they do not do justice to the countries we have seen. They only remind us of the cool breeze off the fjords or the sound of waterfalls as we traveled down rivers surrounded by mountains. We are thankful to Rich Hull for organizing an amazing trip. We are also thankful for the fellowship among the 23 of us. Travel really does broaden your horizons.

Present were: Willis Fagg, Norm Ulmer, Glenn Mitchell, Bob Conrad, Jerry Tulino, Barry Blackwell, and Gina Blackwell The Ulmers were thanked for hosting the meeting.

The minutes of the September Board of Directors' meeting were approved as published in the newsletter.

The Treasurer was absent; no report.

The Vice-President was absent; no report.

The Editor was absent; no report.

Committee Reports:

There were no reports from the *Clinics, Education, Maintenance, Mentor or Social Committees.*

Willis reminded us that the next clinic is Rainbow Ridge, scheduled for 10/15/11 (2 sessions), at the Tucson Botanical Gardens. We were also reminded of the upcoming slide presentation at the Mini Time Machine Museum scheduled for Nov. 3rd. The next social gathering is at the Red Garter on 10/12. Madelyn Cook is moving ahead on the static display at the Mini Time Machine Museum.

We need to explore storage and workspace options with a definite timeline in mind. There are many items being stored by the Ulmers and Martins that need to be consolidated with the other club materials.

Bob Conrad reported on the Tucson Botanical Gardens monthly cleanup – the equipment is in good shape.

New Business:

The issue of visitors to Tucson wanting to see layouts was discussed and it was decided that Jerry would send an email out to the membership and let them respond to the visitors directly.
