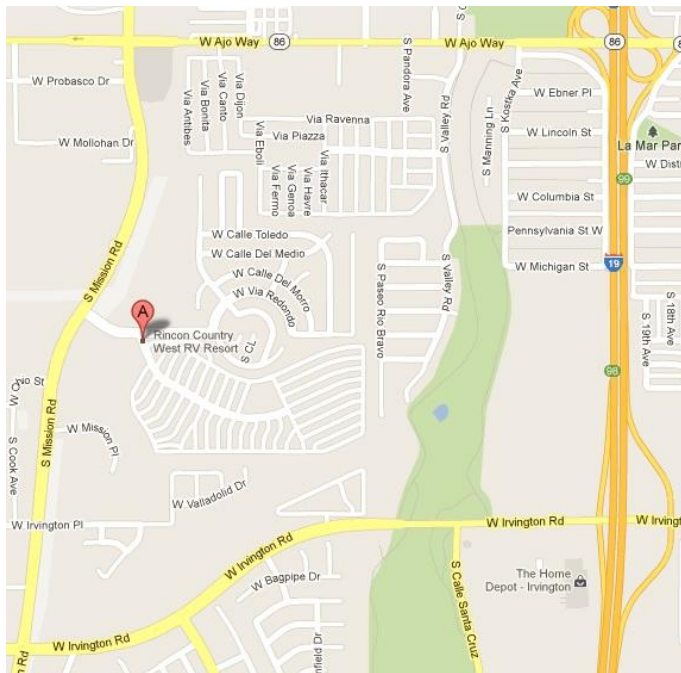

Take I-19 S, go 1.3 mi to Ajo Way, exit 99. Turn Right (W) onto Ajo Way and go 0.9 mi. Turn left (S) at Mission Rd., go 0.6 mi. Turn left at Via Ingresso (first traffic light). Take immediate first Right at Gate House entrance to Rincon Country West RV Resort. Once through gate proceed down Main Boulevard to club layout located on left at end of Boulevard. 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Rincon Country West Railroad

The RCW Railroad is the ongoing project of the RCW Garden Railroad Club located at the Rincon Country West RV resort. The club has been developing its layout over the past seven winters as most of our members are "snowbirds". We have over 900 ft. of track with four independent loops and a trolley line running from the town of Rincon to the circus. This season a second "tourist" trolley line has been added that travels over two bridges over the Rincon Waterfalls.



This trolley line has three trolleys that continuously change positions as they run along the trolley line. Also new this season is the addition of more animation at the circus and the 50's diner.

Throughout the winter months we run over twenty five different locomotives on a posted schedule for the viewing pleasure of park residents and club members. Our Village of Rincon is composed of lighted, scratch built and kit built structures named for existing clubs in the RCW Park (Shuffles Boarding House, Tennis Court House, etc.). Our extensive vegetation is maintained by club members and has its own irrigation system. Our storage Train Depot (built by club members) contains a work bench, shelf and track storage for trains and all our electronics.

Where is everyone?

For an organization with 84 registered families, we should have sufficient resources to support all of our club activities. Of course we have a number of dedicated members who have been major contributors in the past and are now limited in their ability to contribute. We thank them for making the club what it is today. But where are the rest of you? I reviewed the rosters for the past three events, two swap meets and the VA display. By my count we had 26 individuals participating and most, if not all, have been with the club more than five years and the majority at least ten. Granted these events require fewer participants than the upcoming two major events of the year, but it was disappointing that none of our newer members signed up. Participating in our events is part of the learning process required to assure the survival of the club.

So for our newer members, there is plenty of opportunity to join in as a volunteer for our Rails-in-the-Garden Tour (RITG) hosts (sign up for one or two days) and work at least one, hopefully more, shifts at the Pima County fair. The fair offers great opportunity in that we have two shifts per day for eleven days in addition to set-up and tear down (early or late; weekends or weekdays).

What do our event volunteers do?

For RITG: you may run trains, check/sell tickets, answer questions of our visitors (or help them get answers) or help with auto traffic control where the venues may have limited parking.

For the fair: you may run (or learn to run) trains, staff the information table and sell raffle tickets, help the kids run the children's trains (or provide traffic control for the kids that are waiting to run the trains), provide information to visitors, or monitor the layout for little hands wanting to touch. If you participate in the set-up or tear down you will learn the inner workings of the modular layout.

Finally, we have the Rodeo Parade Museum project underway. In the next few weeks/months, we will need members to contribute to the addition of buildings. Contact Jeff Tobin if you can help.

In the past year and a half, I have addressed the above subjects on more than one occasion. This year surprise me and sign up. The future of TGRS is dependent on you our newer members.

In that regard, this is election year and we are needing some newer members to run for the board. Interested members can contact Bob Dirksen or give me a call.

To have another successful RITG in 2013, we need to continue to support the layout hosts. The minutes of the November Board of Directors' meeting were approved as published in the newsletter.

The Treasurer's Report was approved as read. (See January General Meeting minutes for report.)

Vice-President's Report:

2. The Toy Train Swap Meet was good – the children's layout was appreciated.

OLD BUSINESS:

Norm reported that there is a burned circuit in the main board; otherwise, the TMC project is ready to go. Glenn Mitchell is repairing it. There is a monitored TV camera and ID card-access only gate to the layout. The Board approved the expense of adding sound to the steam engine (approximately \$200).

The foam board and track are done at the Rodeo Parade Museum. We need landscaping and buildings and possibly a caboose. The club will be buying some rolling stock from Joe Duda.

There are some issues with engines at the Tucson Botanical Gardens layout. Gary Martin is investigating the problems. New engines may be needed.

The club needs to find storage space very soon. Willis Fagg has researched some storage facility options and found one at Valencia and Old Vail Road that offers a discount to non-profit groups. A 10'x10' unit would run about \$60/month. We would also need shelving for those club items that are used very little or only at the County Fair.

We need to move the trailers from Madelyn Cook's property because she is listing her house later this month. Bob Murphy is willing to store them.

Advertisements for the Michael Broggie lecture in April are pending. The Mini Time Machine Museum will publicize the event. It will be free to the public, but reservations will be required.

The Eberbachs have dropped out of the Rails in the Garden 2013 event due to health issues. Members have been asked to bring their unsold tickets to the General Meeting to exchange for corrected packets.

The club has purchased sixteen items from Richard Creamer for potential use on the new town modules and the Rodeo Parade Museum project. The majority of the items bought were originally crafted by Madelyn Cook.

The date for the picnic at McCormick Stillman Railroad Park is still pending.

NEW BUSINESS:

Bob Dirksen has agreed to compile the slate of officers for the election in May.

Norm Ulmer suggested an addition to the Volunteer Services Recognition Program rules: "Should any member choose to forego the award of a vest and instead opt to use their own Convention vest, they will be awarded a silver Conductor pin in lieu of a vest." This was approved by the Board.

The next general meeting is to be at Rincon Country West on February 9.

The next scheduled Board Meeting is February 7 (Martins to bring the cookies).

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TUCSON GARDEN RAILWAY SOCIETY MINUTES OF THE GENERAL MEETING January 19, 2013

The meeting was called to order by the President, Willis Fagg, at 2 PM at the home of Glenn and Janet Mitchell. There were approximately 48 attendees present.

The Mitchells were thanked for hosting. The guests introduced included Paunee and Phil Uberuaga (now new members) and Jay Catlow.

The minutes of the December 2012 meeting were approved as published in the Newsletter.

The Treasurer's Report was approved as read by Willis Fagg.

1. Total on deposit: \$24,134.
2. Revenues from 11/16/12: \$660.
3. Expenses from 11/16/12: \$4,389.
4. Dues for 2012/2013: \$2,445.

Vice-President's Report:

The VA display was good. The loaned buildings and other items from club members gave it a fresh look.

We did not participate in the January 4-6 Home Show.

The February meeting will be on the 9th at Rincon Country West.

The March meeting will be on the 9th at 10:00 AM at the Tucson Botanical Gardens. Plan to arrive early due to parking issues. They have other events scheduled that day as well.

Setup for the Pima County Fair is tentatively scheduled for 4/11. The Fair itself runs from 4/18 through 4/28. Please see Bob Conrad to volunteer for shifts as soon as possible.

Committee Reports:

Clinics: This committee is currently without a chairperson. No report. There has been no follow-up from Alan Lathrem about a possible clinic.

Education: Nothing new to report.

Maintenance: Gary Martin is waiting to get a mogul from Ryan MacCabe that needs repair.

Membership/Website: Jerry Tulino reported that a new family had joined, John and Maria Cook. He

has updated the website to include a reference to our new Facebook page. Janet Mitchell is the Administrator for the Facebook page. This is currently a “view only” site. Only Janet can make entries and updates.

Mentor: No new requests.

Social: There were six attendees at the last Red Garter Saloon gathering. The next social event will be planned for a Saturday to try and include members who are not yet retired.

OLD BUSINESS:

Norm Ulmer reported that there is now a monitored TV camera for the layout and an ID card access only gate. The patio will be locked down from 5pm to 7am. There is a short in the controller circuit board that needs repair.

The Rodeo Parade Museum staff completed the platform. The track has been laid and we are ready to landscape and decorate the layout. Gary Martin detailed a locomotive to replicate No. 1673. Members were invited to help with the landscaping on January 26 and 27 at 09:30 at the museum (S. 6th and Irvington).

There are maintenance issues reported for the engines and controllers at the Tucson Botanical Gardens – they may require new engines. The other club projects are doing fine.

The 2013 RITG will be March 2 and 3 and will now have ten stops as the Eberbachs have had to withdraw. There are new, corrected ticket packets to pick up and/or exchange. We need helpers for hosts so please contact the hosts as soon as possible to sign up. Notices have gone out to more than 200 on the mailing list and about 500 emails will be going out next week. Flyers and posters are being put up at RV parks, resorts, etc. It is hoped that there will also be TV coverage.

The club needs to find storage space for items that don't fit in the trailers. Willis Fagg has researched some storage facility options and found one at Valencia and Old Vail Road that offers a discount to non-profit groups. A 10'x10' unit would run about \$60/month. Members were asked if they had any shelving they could donate, otherwise the club will purchase storage racks.

Michael Broggie will give two lectures at the Mini Time Machine Museum on April 13 at 10:00 AM and 2:00 PM. He will speak about the history of the Disneyland Park and the train that started it all. Please watch the Newsletter for updates. We are hoping for an article in the Star. The event is free, but reservations are required.

The club has purchased some of Madelyn Cook's buildings for the new town. We still need buildings and a name for the town.

Norm Ulmer handed out some Volunteer Recognition awards to those who were not present at the December meeting. The members present were also told about the option to use their Convention vest in lieu of the volunteer vest. Please

see Norm if you need to exchange your vest for a different size.

NEW BUSINESS:

Bob Dirksen has agreed to be the nominations chairperson for the upcoming elections in May. Please see Bob or Willis to put your hat in the ring.

Gary Martin had items for sale. Members were asked to see him after the meeting.

There was a “stapling-tickets-to-directions party” announced for immediately following the meeting. All were invited to help.
