The Cailyn Crossing RR

The RR started, as I suspect, many others did. I put a G Scale train around the Christmas Tree and found 5 little neighbors watching it with me.

As our kids were starting to have children, I thought their little ones would like it too, so I decided to expand outside. As we were presented with more grandchildren, places and business on the RR were named for them.





The RR time frame is the 1860s with wood burning engines with a few excursions for Thomas the Tank and Snoopy engines. Buildings are a combination of kit and scratch built. Denver and Rio Grande, and Florence and Cripple Creek engines and cars travel from Cailyn Crossing to Justin Junction passing Colin's Farm and Morgan Mountain.





Bob took the whole layout apart and cleaned and re-fabed all of the buildings, plus the track has been re-ballasted.

Wayne presented several members of the club with models he had constructed from plans he found, and explained his reasoning below.

The criteria we used for giving away the cars to our friends was:

Following is a photo of my cars with another photo showing how the poling works. With these cars in a flat multi-track yard one could switch three parallel tracks with the poling car and an engine in the middle and the poles extended either right or left...forward or backward. At the time that was real efficiency...but really dangerous.

Springtime means garden tour time. Here are sneak peeks from (one of) five upcoming events.

CHOLLA PATCH RAILROAD

John Carmichael tries to keep a balance between his 100-yard-long rail line and the cholla, prickly pear and ocotillo that were in his Foothills yard before he laid track.

"I figured it's a garden railway," says Carmichael, whose home is one of the stops in the 2016 Rails in the Garden Tour. "Everyone gets rid of the garden part."

The former horticulturist wrapped his layout around the desert plants, allowing them to serve as giant trees in an 1890s setting. A train station sits halfway up a mesquite.

Carmichael built all of the elements, including 200 feet of redwood trestles that elevate the line into three levels

"I've always loved old-fashioned roller coasters," he says. "And that's what my train looks like."

If you ever manage to get near <u>Monon, Indiana</u>, be sure to stop at the <u>Whistle Stop Café and</u> <u>Monon Connection Museum</u>.

The Monon Railroad, also known as the Chicago, Indianapolis, and Louisville Railway from 1897 to 1956, was an American <u>railroad</u> that operated almost entirely within the state of <u>Indiana</u>. The Monon was merged into the <u>Louisville and</u> <u>Nashville Railroad</u> in 1971, and much of the former Monon right of way is owned today by <u>CSX</u> <u>Transportation</u>. In 1970 it operated 540 miles (870 km) of road on 792 miles (1,275 km) of track; that year it reported 1320 million tonmiles of revenue freight and zero passengermiles. (It showed zero miles of double track, the longest such Class I railroad in the country.)
