The 7/8n2 Symposium By Norm Ulmer

The 7/8n2 Symposium was conducted as scheduled (15 November) at Norm Ulmer's house, and was attended by Bill Joplin, Bob Averill, Bruce Somerhalder, Glenn Mitchell, Ron Koehler, Jerry Wilson and Wayne Wesolowski. As intended, it was a round table discussion, covering not only the world of 2-foot narrow gauge modeling, 2-foot narrow gauge railroads in general, but all phases of modeling from developing plans to construction materials, glues, forming methods and tools. Each of the attendees contributed something from their personal experiences, and in the end, all seemed pleased with the group discussion.

Following the discussion phase, we toured Norm's shop and witnessed a 7-ton Porter 0-4-0 saddle tank engine under construction, in what else, 7/8n2 scale.

As we broke up, Jerry Wilson mentioned that he had brought along an interesting way to battery power an engine. The example he showed us was a Bachmann 10 wheeler, into the tender of which he had installed his controls and battery pack.

What was very interesting was his adaptation of an 18 V Ryobi battery pack which he has rigged to plug into the holder receptacle from a Ryobi battery charger. The Ryobi battery is a Lithium Ion pack, and the whole thing fits nicely into the tender using a tall wood fuel load. Perhaps Jerry could be talked into giving a clinic on this system.

Superstition Mountain Museum

"Dutchman's Gulch, a journey through Arizona history via a huge Garden-scale model train exhibit designed to delight model train enthusiasts and make learning fun for history students of all ages."



A brochure for the Superstition Mountain Museum uses the previous statement to introduce a new and outstanding attraction. The Museum, 4087 Apache Trail east of Phoenix is an outdoor park-like area occupying the former Apacheland Movie Ranch. It includes a barn containing a history of actors featured over the years when this area was used as a Movie and TV production area. In addition, there is the indoor museum, an occasionally operated stamp mill, a working blacksmith, a chapel, gift shop, stagecoach, performance area and other western displays. The new, outdoor, seasonal train exhibit is by far the greatest attraction.



The 1500 feet of track is displayed on a raised horseshoe-shaped area surrounding an even higher raised viewing area. The exhibit displays the role of the railroad in Arizona during the period from 18875 to 1930. There are 7 numbered sections: 1. Native American Settlement circa 1500, 2. Southern Arizona circa 1690, 3. Roosevelt Dam circa 1905-1911, 4. Gold Mine circa 1860, 5. Silver Mine circa 1859, 6. Cattle Ranch circa 1865 and 7. Frontier Town Circa 1864 and forward. The coming of the railroad to Arizona enabled the transport of the five "C's -(cattle, cotton, citrus, copper and tourists to enjoy the climate).

Photography is encouraged and the exhibit is situated so that there are many opportunities for panoramic and close-up views.

The G-gauge exhibit was begun 2 1/2 years ago. The exhibit was set in motion by museum member and volunteer Barbara Jebelian , who chose to share her late husband's train collection. Many other supporters and volunteers have donated money and components. ABTO has provided much of the labor and supervision of the operation and maintenance. The exhibit is a fine representative of modeling. The railroad crew is putting out a call for volunteers. Call the museum at 480-983-4888 and speak with the volunteer coordinator.



The railroad held its grand opening on November 17. A good crown enjoyed the occasion. The railroad is well worth the trip! And there are additional exhibits to enjoy.

The museum is open 9 am - 4 pm daily. Closed Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's Day. Call <u>480-928-4888</u> for information about when the trains are running. Admission \$5 adults, \$4 seniors, \$2 Students with I.D., Children under 17 Free.
