

Auckland Garden Railway Society Meeting

Michael and Elizabeth's meeting, The Rockwood Gorge Railway.

As you probably noticed our weather hasn't been conducive to garden railroading for most of this year. Holding a garden meeting involves not just cleaning the track but also the presentation of the lawn, hedges etc., etc. The first meeting date was set back a week just giving me a little more time to get it ready.

Having built most of the track to a comfortable height has made maintenance a lot easier in my old age, but the river section is causing me great difficulties in climbing up and then having to kneel for weeding and the track cleaning part. I even had to take a panel of corrugated iron off from behind the railway just to weed part of that section. There's a risk of falling into the pond.

Anyway, the weather on the delayed day turned out just right, not too hot, or cold. The usual procedure is to run track power first as I now have one of the few layouts where this is possible and with running alongside battery power, we can run two trains at once on the large circuit.

We had three Stainz locos running on the day. One being a very early brown version belonging to Bruce Cropper which was very reluctant to run at first pulling three Bachmann Thomas six wheeled coaches. These coaches looked very nice along with the goods trucks that Bachmann offer, and one day someone will see the potential to deface a Thomas, James or Diesel and add a few extra details, a paint job and you would have a very reasonable outline British rail train.

A new member James Davison was welcomed to the group. He brought along an LGB starter set to run. The third Stainz was one Hugh Keal had converted to battery power hauling a mixture of LGB dump trucks and some extra ones he has 3D printed.

Chris Cole's finished up the track power with his early Bachmann 4-6-0 having a run before the afternoon tea was served; then the live steam boys took over to oil up the track. Trevor Brooker ran his kit-built Billy and Grant Alexander ran his early Roundhouse 2-6-2 Liberty Bell. The last one out for the day was my Sandy River train and although I still think its new, it is now three years old; see how time goes.

Anyway, it was a good meeting, the weather held, and it was great catching up with members.

Our next meeting will be at Robert Grahams house on Saturday 22 November or if wet on Sunday 23 November. This meeting will include our AGM so the start time will be 13:30. 







The Hara Model Railway Museum

- Yokohama, Japan

The gauge one model railway layout that forms the centrepiece of the Hara Model Railway Museum in Yokohama Japan.

1. Introduction

This article came about through a suggestion from Iain Collingwood, editor of the NZ Garden Whistle, having seen my newsletter covering our visit to this attraction. With the thought of an article sown, I could hardly refuse. As a background to this, Priscilla and I had been touring the top half of Japan for four weeks and had managed to get back to Narita safely ready to fly out. Having returned the hire car, we were left with two days before our night flight back to NZ. Thus, we agreed that each of us could choose what we would do for one of these days. Day one saw us head out to Sakura in Central Tokyo for Priscilla to try on a kimono for a photographic session. Nuff said! However, on day two it was my turn. Now I had discovered a permanent model railway show featuring a gauge one railway as its centre piece. This was the work of a single Japanese enthusiast and is located about five minutes' walk from Yokohama railway station and about 30 minutes south of Tokyo Central. Even better was the fact that some of the N'ex trains, connecting Narita Airport to Tokyo, go on to Yokohama before they terminate. One complication is that most of these split at Tokyo Central so we had to be sure that we sat in the correct coach. Fortunately, since we had to be on particular trains (our return train was a deadline we had to meet in order to get to the airport in time to check in for our flight) we were able to avail ourselves of the free seat reservation facilities which took care of this particular impediment.

Thus, we travelled south having the pleasure of simply passing through the black hole that is Tokyo Central Station without having to change trains. Anyone who has experienced this station has my sympathy. It is the railway equivalent of the Bermuda triangle which, if travelling to Tokyo, is almost impossible to avoid. Whilst a smaller station than Central, Yokohama is still sizeable albeit on a single level which makes life a little easier. One of the challenges in locating the museum is finding out which exit to take from the station. There is a major shopping centre sitting below the platforms and over half the walk was undertaken through various passageways past these shops. However, using a station map provided by a helpful station information centre assistant, allowed me to navigate this particular maze without too much difficulty. Once in the open at the correct exit, the remaining short distance to the museum was straightforward.

N.B. 1 The website suggests buying tickets beforehand either on the web or at local 7-11 stores. We didn't and on arrival, found a ticket machine in the entrance hall where we paid our money and gained access.

N.B. 2 As with a lot of restaurants and numerous food and beverage dispensing machines, the sole means of making purchases on site is through these. A lot don't have English options, however using a translator app on the phone helps with most language difficulties. This also applies to purchasing train tickets as well.

We went midweek outside school holidays which meant it was relatively quiet. So, no problems getting in. They do restrict numbers at busy times. The main focus of the museum is gauge one although gauge O and HO are also represented. In terms of the photos below, all models shown are gauge one unless noted otherwise.





The museum is dedicated to the work of Nobutaro Hara pictured right. A number of the models were hand built and represent examples from around the world. He also worked in HO and O gauge. However, the dominant area of his activity was in Gauge One as noted above.

2. Static Displays


There are a significant number of these displaying his models, both hand built and commercially purchased as well. The displays form a brilliant background to the main gauge one railway.



An example of his craftsmanship with these wonderful hand-built carriages. Apologies for the glare reflecting off the glass casing. It was impossible to avoid this. However, the carriages were too beautiful to not photograph.



The bogie detail and an example of his craftsmanship. As will be seen below, he was a fan of proper bogie articulation and followed the prototype in this regard. As such, he was way ahead of his time and the commercial sector still has yet to catch up with this area of technical accuracy that he has achieved. Every component of the bogie mechanism, apart from the brakes, operates as per the prototype. The end veranda gate is also worthy of mention as well.



3. HO Representation of Yokohama Station

There are two operating layouts. Firstly, this 'impression' of Yokohama Station. It was a little disappointing since it is nothing like Yokohama, hence their use of the word 'impression'. The real thing has ten platforms including a number for the Shinkansen. However, the scenic modelling and lighting effects are good, as can be seen.





4. The Gauge One Railway

Without a doubt, this is the main event of the show and it really is jaw dropping. I spent over an hour just gazing in between visiting other parts of the exhibition. There was so much to see. The standard of modelling is uniformly exquisite, matched only by the train running which was so smooth and reassuringly prototypical. They really did have presence.



The track plan of the gauge one railway. It measures 30 metres by 10 metres, has 4 main running tracks, plus a separate smaller inner circle and an out and back shuttle on the left.



This is a fully scenic model railway on a massive scale based on a European theme.



The modelling is magnificent and I spent a lot of time just gazing at the superb craftmanship on display. Needless to say, the trains ran perfectly.



The centrepiece is the main station building which I estimate to be about 1 metre tall and at least 4 metres long. The operators in the background give some idea of the size. It is huge.



The detail is also staggering particularly when you remember it is the work of one person.



As with the smaller layout, the room lights dim for a night scene from time to time, at which point all the windows light up and not all at once but in random stages, e.g. some of the building windows on the left are not yet illuminated.



A major feature is this roundhouse. Remember this is gauge one.



From time to time the turntable is given a spin (slowly of course).






The scenic work around the railway is simply stunning with a lot of detail. The amount of work that must have gone into this is simply incredible.

5. Engineering Techniques



Some hand-built pantographs. The all work and a number of the models, using these, take their power from the overhead lines just like the prototype.



An explanation of the bogie articulation complete with independent bolster and swing links together with the dual spring arrangements, as I have recently promoted and used on the BR mark one carriages. These smooth out the stock movement over some deliberately poor track as is being shown on the right. I am awestruck that Mr. Hara was several decades ahead of me in matching the prototype systems in this vital area, and better than I have achieved.

This latter site contains a lot more information. However, unless you are fluent in Japanese you will need to translate the site into English. I spent about two hours there which was sufficient to relax my way around. It could be done in an hour particularly at quiet times as I experienced. But for me it was therapeutic to just be able to watch the trains go by and experience the changing light conditions without feeling rushed at all.

N.B., they have a strict one entry, one exit policy with no returns. Whilst there are really good toilets as Japan excels in, there is no catering. Thus, it's a good idea to eat before arrival and/or after you have finished.

Fortunately, Yokohama Station shopping centre has a lot of catering facilities ranging from traditional Japanese fare to European and, if you are desperate, even a McDonalds! For coffee lovers there is a Starbucks as well!

All in all, this was a wonderful conclusion to our visit to the northern half of Japan.








